



Calhoun Named "College of Promise"

Calhoun received notification earlier this year from Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of *America's Promise*, that the college has been designated a national "College of Promise".

According to Powell, the "College of Promise" program was designed to dovetail with other programs of "promise" established through the *America's Promise - The Alliance for Youth* initiative, founded in 1997 as a result of the President's Summit for America's Future.

"I am happy to learn of the recent commitment that Calhoun Community College has made to our Nation's youth," said Powell. "America's Promise was established to lead a national campaign to rally support for

delivering the resources our youth deserve, and Calhoun has become an integral part of our success," he added.

As a "College of Promise" Calhoun joins such colleges, universities, and institutions as the University of Southern California, Eastern Kentucky, Florida State University, and the American Association of Community Colleges.

Calhoun's commitment to the work of America's Promise has been further demonstrated in its recent involvement in the Promise Fellows program. Former Calhoun students Terry Tucker and Albert Bush are currently serving as local Promise Fellows, supporting the efforts of Decatur's Promise to provide 2,000 area youth with the fundamental resources needed for success by the year 2000.

College Hosts World Premier of *A Civil Rights Journey*

When local physician Sonnie Hereford III captured 8mm film footage of historical events in Huntsville during the height of the Civil Rights movement in the early '60s, he had no idea that these same scenes would be used to produce the documentary "A Civil Rights Journey" some 37 years later.

The premier of Hereford's 30-minute documentary was hosted by Calhoun Community College during Black History Month and coincided with the informal opening of Calhoun's Center for the Study of Southern Political Culture. Calhoun Social Science Instructor Waymon Burke, who also served as project director for the Hereford documentary project, heads the Center. The documentary recounts the course of activities which led to a peaceful end to segregation in Huntsville, and includes scenes of lunch counter sit-ins, boycotts, picket lines and footage from a visit to the city by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

According to Burke, funding for the documentary was provided through a grant from the Alabama Council on the Arts. "Clement Howton played a central role in obtaining an Alabama State Council on the Arts grant which paid for production of the film. The Calhoun Foundation provided money to acquire rights to the original footage and some other activities. Dr. Cathy Hansberry's

cooperation was critical, as was Dr. Carpenter's support, especially in the beginning of the project," said Burke.

Burke also expressed appreciation to many individuals in the community for their involvement with the project. "Robert Lane and the Carleton Company were among the most involved community supporters in production of the documentary," said Burke. "Robert was very generous with his time in assisting with the editing of the film and took a real pride of ownership in the project."

Hereford, who now works as an adjunct instructor at Calhoun, plans to distribute copies of the film to local schools, colleges, and libraries.

Alumni, faculty, staff and friends now have the opportunity to create a new tradition at Calhoun Community College through the Foundation's Commemorative Walkway project. This landscaped area will help beautify the campus, and proceeds will support students who will lead Alabama into the new millenium.

"We believe this walkway will become a focal point of the campus," Foundation Director Dr. Cathy Hansberry said. "It will serve as a gathering place for students and visitors and will enable anyone to contribute to the college in a meaningful way. The walkway will be a daily reminder of the people who have helped to make Calhoun Community College a strong educational institution, and at the same time, it will support program improvements for student success."

Through the Commemorative Walkway project the Foundation will continue to assist 23 clubs and organizations and over 40 departmental programs. Other Foundation priorities include scholarships, campus beautification, and student support, such as supporting telephone registration. The Calhoun Foundation has awarded approximately \$735,000 in student projects and in excess of \$488,000 in scholarships to date.

Calhoun employees made the first gifts to the project by contributing to the purchase of bricks in memory of former employees Bertha Bailey, Betsy Cantrell, Wendy Williams, and Dr. Lynn Headrick. To date, a total of 78 bricks have been purchased.

Fennell Honored as Outstanding Alumnus of the Year

Each year as part of the Chancellor's Awards program, outstanding two-year college alumni from across the state are honored. Alumni selected for recognition are honored for outstanding contributions and accomplishments that have been made in the community and society as a whole.

Dr. Rick Fennell, resident physician at Carraway Methodist Medical Center in Birmingham, was selected as Calhoun's recipient of the 1998-99 Alumni of the Year award. A 1982 graduate of Calhoun, Dr. Fennell earned a nursing degree from the College after serving a stint in the Army. "While in the Army, I had been doing well for myself, and then I came home," said Fennell. "There were no jobs, and it was hard to take all of that," he added.

Not long after that, things began looking up when Fen-

nell made the decision to continue his education and to attend Calhoun Community College. "I was hesitant about returning to college after three years in the military; however, Calhoun reinforced the fact that I could do anything I wanted to in life."

After earning his nursing degree from Calhoun, Fennell worked first at Decatur General Hospital and then at Baptist Medical Center Princeton in the cardiac intensive care unit. He went on to become a nurse and physician's assistant for a group of cardiologists, while earning a business degree from Birmingham Southern.

It was during his work with the cardiologists group that Fennell said a mentor, Dr. Robert Newell Minchum, encouraged him to become a doctor. Fennell took pre-med courses at the University of Alabama in Birmingham and in 1991 entered medical school. Now a third-year resident physician at Carraway, Fennell is finally seeing his dreams of becoming a medical doctor come true.

School-to-Work Career Partnership Awarded \$300,000 Grant

A partnership between Calhoun Community College and the Decatur-Morgan County Chamber of Commerce has grown into a region-wide workforce development program that has been awarded a \$300,000 federal grant.

The School-to-Career (STC) Partnership, which includes six secondary schools, Calhoun Community College, Athens State University, and economic development groups and numerous civic and governmental agencies in the Morgan-Lawrence-Limestone county area, was awarded the grant through the Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs (ADECA). The grant award period runs June 1, 1999, to July 30, 2000.

According to Dr. Mary Yarbrough, chairperson of the Business Division at Calhoun, member of the STC Partnership Steering Committee, and author of the grant proposal, the grant will be used to implement programs within the partnership's three-county area to support school to work activities as a part of local workforce development initiatives. "The emphases of our STC Partnership include identifying needs of area businesses and industries and meeting those needs to enhance economic development in North Alabama," said Dr. Yarbrough. "The awarding of this grant to the local partnership will ensure we are able to continue our work."

"The STC Partnership focuses on business and industry involvement as a means of upgrading the 'image' of technical education and attract more students into technical career fields of study," said Calhoun President Richard Carpenter. Fostering and helping develop closer and more involved relationships between business and education is a major emphasis of the STC Partnership.

"The success of this partnership is evidence that public/private partnerships work," commented Sid McAnnally, chairman of the Decatur/Morgan County Chamber of Commerce. "The citizens of this community have invested in this partnership to ensure that our young people are well prepared for the future," said McAnnally. "Through the funding we have received from this grant, we will be able to implement programs, revise high school curriculums, and conduct work-based learning experiences to adequately prepare our students for emerging technologically-based careers."

According to Dr. Yarbrough, funding from the grant will be used to pilot *Work Keys* as a method of testing tenth grade students to help them in career assessment and curriculum planning. *Work Keys* is a national system used to assess the skills required for a job and provide training to fill the gap between what is needed and where an individual is at that point in time.

College's AmeriCorps Program Recognizes Outstanding Elementary Students

The Calhoun Community College AmeriCorps Program (CAP) recognized local elementary school students with a "Fun From Books" carnival, on May 17, 1999, at the college's Decatur campus.

Close to 150 students in grades K-3 representing each of the 12 elementary schools in Decatur participated. The carnival was held to recognize those students who made the most significant improvements in reading and behavioral skills dur-

ing the last two months of the school year.

A student committee made up of fourth - seventh graders planned a number of fun events, games, and other activities for the younger students. According to Gina Battle, director of Calhoun's AmeriCorps Program, each child participating in the carnival received a t-shirt and free book to take home.

The Calhoun AmeriCorps program was started by the College last fall and is funded through a grant from the Corporation of National Service. Currently, 20 AmeriCorps members work with youth in the Decatur area in various tutoring and extended day care programs through the city's elementary schools, as well as with Decatur Youth Services in its youth-related programs.

Calhoun's AmeriCorps program is one of several different programs in which the College is involved as part of the America's Promise program, coordinated by Gen. Colin Powell.

Governor Visits Calhoun to Promote HOPE Scholarships

Alabama Gov. Don Siegelman spoke at a press conference held at Calhoun Community College on June 2nd. He informed a packed classroom of students and staff on his plans to ensure a college education for most Alabama students with the passing of the state lottery legislation. "Every high school graduate will be able to go to college if they stay out of trouble, stay in school and maintain their grades," Siegelman said.

He presented Calhoun President Dr. Richard Carpenter a signed replica of a bill creating the Office of HOPE College Scholarships. The HOPE (Helping Outstanding Pupils Educationally) College Scholarship requires that high school students planning to attend a university have a B average. Students enrolling in technical schools will be eligible for the scholarship regardless of their grades; however, they must maintain a B average to keep the scholarship.

The lottery amendment legislation is set for the October 12 vote.



Calhoun Students Among Those Recognized on All-Alabama Academic Team

Calhoun Community College students Shannon D. Fielding and Julia A. Kedrova were selected earlier this year for inclusion in the 1999 All-Alabama Academic Team program, sponsored by the Alabama Department of Postsecondary Education.

Patterned after the USA Today/Phi Theta Kappa/American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) Academic All-American Team program, the All-Alabama Academic Team program recognizes and honors the most outstanding students within the Alabama College System for academic and leadership performance. Students selected for the state recognition have been ranked nationally among community college students throughout the country.

Rankings for All-Alabama Team members are determined by the scores the nominees receive from judges selecting the winners for the Academic All-American Team program. The top-ranked student from each college in the Alabama College System comprises the All-Alabama First Team, and the second ranked student from each college is included on the Second Team.

Calhoun's First Team Member is Shannon Fielding. A native of Athens, Alabama, Shannon is the son of Tim and Sheila Fielding. A recent graduate of the College, Shannon served as Phi Theta Kappa's President, was an SGA Senator, chairperson for the Parking Appeals Committee, and participated in BACCHUS/SADD activities while at Calhoun. His academic honors included Who's Who Among Students in American Junior Colleges, 1998; Associate in Applied Science Degree in Design Drafting Technology (with honors), August 1998; Recipient of a Leadership Scholarship at Calhoun, USAA All American Scholar, 1997; and National Dean's List, 1997.

Calhoun's Second team member, Julia Kedrova, is a resident of Trinity. Originally from Kyiv, Ukraine, Julia is the daughter of Natalie Kedrova and Anatoly Kedrov. Julia, who was a member of Phi Theta Kappa since 1998, served as the organization's Treasurer and was awarded Two Star Achievement Status last year. A 1999 Calhoun graduate, she was nominated to be an attendant at Calhoun's 1998 Homecoming activities. Her academic honors included Who's Who Among Students in American Junior Colleges, November 1998; All American Scholar Collegiate Award—U.S. Achievement Academy, September 1998; Calhoun's President's List, National Dean's List, September 1998; and recipient of the Willie E. Hodges Memorial Scholarship through the Calhoun Community College Foundation, June 1998.

The All-Alabama Academic Team was established in 1995 as a joint effort between the Alabama College System, the Alabama Department of Postsecondary Education, and Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society. Each team member recognized was awarded an All-Alabama Academic Team medallion and a legislative resolution. First team members received a \$600 stipend and second team members received \$300.

Calhoun Student One of Twelve to Receive National Scholarship

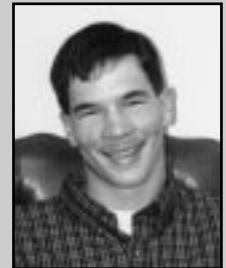
Randy Caudle is an exceptional young man who overcame amazing odds to become a successful student at Calhoun Community College. The fact that he recently received a major national award in Washington, D.C. is testimony to his focus and determination to succeed.

Randy entered foster care in 1992 after a problem in his family. He was moved around from foster home to foster home, forcing him at one point to attend five different schools in one year. As a result, he ended up dropping out of high school. But rather than wallow in his failure, Randy chose to succeed. He passed his GED, then applied to Calhoun where he is currently majoring in physical education with an emphasis in geriatrics. While attending school, he also maintains a full-time job as a dietitian at a local nursing home. Randy receives no financial assistance or support from his family.

To recognize him as one of the outstanding foster youth in the country, Randy was flown to Washington as one of 12 students chosen from hundreds who applied to the Orphan Foundation of America (OFA) to receive OLIVER scholarships.

The OLIVER Project was designed five years ago as a national leadership and scholarship program to honor college-bound foster youth. OLIVER — an acronym for Orphan Leadership Initiative: Value, Education, Resources — is the only national program of its kind and receives no state or federal funding. Each of this year's winners will receive a scholarship totaling \$7,500.

The OFA has awarded nearly one million dollars in privately raised money to foster youth in 44 states who are pursuing post-secondary education or training.
